- 2. All entries must be submitted through the FCCLA/FFA Instructor or the County Agent upon arrival. No pre-entering is required. Entries are limited to two 4-H booths per County and one booth per FFA & FCCLA chapter. Two 4-H booths per County and one booth per FFA & FCCLA chapter will be considered
- 3. Exhibit dimensions are 48" wide by 30" deep. Exhibits should stand no taller than 48". Each exhibit will have 1/2 of a 30" by 8' folding table for display. Exhibits will have restricted access, and every possible care will be taken to prevent damage or loss; but in no case will the Fair be responsible for damage or loss that may occur.
- 4. All exhibits will receive \$50 for Blue, \$35 for Red, \$25 for White ribbons and \$100 to the Sweepstakes winner of the 4-H division and \$100 to the Sweepstakes winner of the FCCLA/FFA division.
- 5. Signs will be provided for club or chapter name.
- 6. Exhibits must be in place between 2:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M., Monday, September 15.
- 7. Exhibits will be released from 2-6 p.m. on Tuesday September 30. Exhibits left after the 6 p.m. release time will become property of the Arkansas/Oklahoma Fair.

- **1.Livestock Breed Identification:** (20 possible points) Identify from photographs 20 livestock (beef cattle, swine, sheep, and goat) breeds. A list of breeds will be provided.
- 2. Livestock Equipment Identification: (30 possible points) Identify the proper name for 30 pieces of equipment used in livestock production. A list of equipment will be provided.
- 3. Feed Identification: (10 possible points) Identify 10 types of feed. A list of feeds will be provided.
- 4. Retail Meat Cut Identification: (30 possible points) Identify 15 beef, lamb, and/or pork retail cuts from pho- tographs. Contestants will identify the cut by species and retail cut name. A list of species and retail cut names will be provided.
- 5. Hay and Wool Judging: (100 possible points) Rank a class of four hay samples and four wool fleeces. Analy- sis information will be provided for the hay samples.

4-H HORTICULTURE CONTEST

The contest will consist of judging and identification of plant specimens. For the full list of potential specimens, as well as study materials, please see the plant lists in the "Projects, Contests and Activities" section of the National Junior Horticulture

Association website at:

There will be 3 classes of four (4) plates. Each will be judged on the basis of condition, quality, uniformity, true-to-type, and size. Classes will be taken from any of the lists (see the website above) of the four commodity groups to be indentified/judged (fruits and nuts, vegetables and herbs, flowering/indoor plants and woody ornamentals). Plates in each class will be ranked from first to last. Scores will be determined by a Hormel calculator. Oral reasons will not be required of contestants.

The identification portion includes a total of 40 samples from any of the lists of the four commodity groups to be indentified/judged.

The final score will be determined by the total score of the judging classes (50 pointes possible each) plus the identification test (200 points possible).

Ribbons will be awarded to the top ten (10).

- 3. Each Division (Jr., Sr.) will consist of a system of questions relative to the Poultry Project. Curriculum materials and contact information is listed below.
- 4. No pre-entry is required. Entry Fee is FREE! The contest will begin at 10:00 a.m. Each contestant will be given a scorecard which must be presented to Skill-A-Thon Officials to complete. It is the responsibility of the contestant to keep up with his or her scorecard.

5. Competition Structure:

Junior: Five Stations 25 pts. per station Senior: Five Stations 25 pts. per station

Contest will be 100 point contest. (Four Stations x 25 potential points=100)

Station 5 is a Timed-Tie Breaker Station. Score at this station will be used only in the event of a tie in total scores of Stations 1-4. The first Tie Breaker consideration is the contestant's SCORE at Station 5-the second Tie Breaker consideration is the contestant's TIME at Station 5. The contestants will have a maximum of 4 minutes to complete each station. Moderator will tabulate score at station. Questions will be either right or wrong. No "judgment" made by Station Moderator.

Contest Classes

All age divisions will have the same contest topics, however the actual questions may vary depending on age appropriateness. For example, Juniors may be asked basic questions while Seniors are asked more in depth questions on the same topic.

Class 1 – External Parts-The contestant must be able to identify a given number of external parts of poultry. Seniors should also be able to identify 5 of the 8 Chicken Combs.

Class 2 – Parts of an Egg – The Contestant must be able label the parts of the egg. Seniors should also be able to label the parts of the egg and match the definition/function of the egg part.

Class 3 - Breed identification- The contestant must be able to identify five common poultry breeds. Seniors should also know the origin and/or important traits of each breed.

Class 4 - Quality Assurance-The contestant should be able to identify five types of diseases. Seniors should also know how the disease is transmitted and treated.

Class 5 – Feed and Nutrition-Tie Breaking Station- The contestant should be able to identify common feed- stuffs. Seniors should also be able to tell what nutrient group the feed stuff belongs with.

5. Competition Structure:

Contest will be scored a total 100 potential points. Junior Division: Four stations 25 points per station Senior Division: Four stations 25 points per station Each division will compete in a fifth station to serve as a timed-tie breaker station. The score at this station will be used only in the event of a tie in total scores of stations 1-4. The first tie breaker consideration is the contestant's score at station 5, the second tie breaker consideration is the contestant's time at station 5.

The contestants will have a maximum of 5 minutes to complete each station. A moderator will tabulate scores at each station.

Questions will be either right or wrong, no judgments will be made by the station moderator.

Contest Classes

All age divisions will have the same contest topics, however the actual questions may vary depending on age appropriateness. Juniors may be asked basic questions while Seniors are asked more in depth questions.

Class 1 – External Parts The contestant must be able to identify a given number of external parts of rabbits. Seniors should also be able to identify ear carriage and body type.

Class 2 - Breed Identification The contestant must be able to identify 8 common rabbit breeds. Seniors should also know the body and fur type of each breed.

Class 3 - Ailments and Disorders The contestant must be able to identify five types of ailments and disorders. Seniors should also know how they are to be treated.

Class 4 – Housing and Handling The contestant must be able to identify the proper housing and rabbit handling in a given number of described situations.

Class 5 - Faults and Disqualifications in Show Rabbits The contestant must be able to identify faults and disqualifications in a given number of described animals. Seniors should also know proper and improper conformation.
